This culture is native to New Zealand. The Māori people speak te reo Māori, and the culture still exists today, so there are many people who keep their traditions alive.



They live in New Zealand. Their traditional food includes hāngi, which is cooked underground, and also fish, meat and vegetables. They wear traditional cloaks made from natural materials, and they are known for their tattoos called moko. One of their most famous traditions is the haka, which is a ceremonial dance. They also have strong spiritual beliefs and respect their ancestors a lot.

The Māori were colonized by the United Kingdom. In 1840, the Treaty of Waitangi was signed, but the British didn't fully respect their culture. The Māori lost land, there were conflicts, and British customs were imposed. Even so, Māori culture has survived and is still important today.
